A Message from the Interim City Manager



There is no doubt that 2022 has been a remarkable year for the City of Rawlins.

Rawlins had a busy summer full of community events which will continue into fall and winter. As we welcome the cooler weather, we encourage everyone to get out and enjoy all the wonderful resources the City of Rawlins has to offer. During the fall season our parks and walkways are perfect for walking, running, cycling, playing or just sitting and taking in the beautiful view. During the winter season our recreational facilities are wonderful places to escape the cold to exercise, take part in your favorite indoor sport, and roller-skate.

As you read through this newsletter and activity guide you will see all that the City of Rawlins has to offer. This is only possible through the enormous contributions of our employees and the direction and empowerment given by our City Council. It is a great time to live in Rawlins.

A couple new amenities in Rawlins this summer has been the opening of Rawlins Dog Park and the Joshua "JR" Rodriguez Skate Park. Both parks are in Key Club Park. They have been very popular during the summer and fall.

Water

One of the challenges that we face this year is the ongoing drought and an aging water system. This has led to water restrictions and major repairs to our water transmission line. To upgrade and modernize our water system will be an enormous undertaking encompassing several years. This past year the city replaced 10,000 feet of wood stave pipeline and replaced it with PVC pipeline. Moving forward the city plans to rehabilitate the 32-mile steel transmission line including cathodic protection, air/vac valves, and blow-off valves. The City is also working to start up the water pre-treatment plant which will allow water from the North Platte River and our reservoirs to supplement the spring water received from the mountains south of town.

Finances

In terms of the city's financial reporting, we recently completed two outstanding financial audits. During the summer, the city completed the audits for fiscal year 2020 and fiscal year 2021. The completion of these audits brings the city into compliance with financial reporting standards. Beginning in July 2022, the City began issuing detailed monthly financial performance reports to accompany our monthly department reports. City Council Assesses Community Strategic Plan Progress

In 2022, City of Rawlins Council determined that our City should continue addressing five major issues facing our community today. On October 18th, they received a 75 minute report on Council and staff progress covering July-September 2022. Employees:

- Council passed 3% COLA in new budget and continued full insurance benefits
- Partnered with Wyoming Workforce to host three community job fairs
- Hosted successful safety walkthroughs and began program development with Wyoming Workers Compensation Safety and Risk Division



Beautification:

- Council funded a law review to lobby the State for greater municipal authority to address and remove dangerous buildings
- Council approved landfill vouchers, which were sent for use in September
- Major improvements were made to City Hall and Parks

- 10,000 feet of Woodstave pipeline replaced and connected to springs system, funded by the council in winter 2021
- Hired Y2 Consultants to diagnose and begin work to restart the water pre-treatment plant

Community & Economic Development:



Help our Dispatch Center Help You!

The Rawlins Police Department Communications Center dispatches the Rawlins Police Department, Rawlins Fire Department and Rawlins Ambulance services to the citizens of Rawlins. When contacting the police department dispatch center, whether by calling the non-emergency line at 307-328-4530 or by calling/texting 9-1-1, there are several things to remember.

- The most important information we need is your location. Have the address available for the dispatcher when you call. If you don't know the address look around you at street signs and landmarks such as parks, grocery stores and restaurants.
- It is important to stay as calm as possible so that the dispatcher can get the information necessary to send you the proper help as quickly as possible.
- Remember to listen carefully to the questions the dispatcher is asking, there is a specific reason we ask the questions in a certain order. Answering the dispatcher's questions does not delay response by emergency services, while you are answering the questions the dispatcher is relaying the information to the officers, firefighters or ambulance crew, either by radio or sending it to a computer in the officer's vehicle.
- Try to remember as much information as possible such as descriptions of vehicles or people involved, directions they may be headed or things they may have said.
- If you are calling from a cell phone it is best to stay in one place if possible, so you don't get disconnected causing a possible delay in response.



Did you know that the Rawlins Police Department can receive text messages to 911? This is a fantastic service if you are unable to speak or not comfortable talking to a 911 dispatcher with others around. Simply type 911 in the To: field on your phone. When typing your message let the dispatcher know where you are and what the emergency is. They will continue to text until help arrives or until you feel safe enough to make a voice call. In some cases, we can also find your location, but it is better if you can give your location.

Additional Tools the RPD Communications Center Uses to Improve Response

RAPID SOS



Rapid SOS provides the dispatcher with the location of the cell phone you are using in most cases. It has a 90-95 percent accuracy rate within 10 feet of your location. At times it will give us an address you are calling from and in large buildings we can narrow it down to a specific area. If you have emergency data, such as emergency contact information in your phone that information is sometimes relayed to the dispatch center. This is automatic and does not require you to sign up for anything.

RAVE SMART 911

Rave Smart 911 is an app for your cell phone or you can sign up with a computer. This allows the individual user to share important information with the dispatch center to provide a better response. To sign-up visit smart911.com or download on the Apple App Store or Google Play today.



You decide what personal information you want to share, including:

- Addresses of home or work.
- Any members of your household with descriptions and photos if you wish.
- Any health concerns for anyone in your household, such as oxygen use, wheelchair use or immobility.
- If you have a member of your household that is deaf, hard of hearing or otherwise challenged this would be great information for anyone responding to an emergency at your home.
- What vehicle or vehicles you may drive. This is important especially if you call from somewhere other than your home.
- Do you have pets? This app allows you to list what pets may be in the home as well as a place to share their photo. This would alert firefighters or police that they need to look for your pets.
- We can also respond by text message to cell phone users. In some instances, this works when a phone may have very little cellular service.
- If you are in a building that has several floors, we can get a good idea of your exact location.
- If you travel anywhere that has Rave Smart 911 in their dispatch center, they will also receive the information you have provided.
- **Your information is only shared if you call 911.** There is no access to private information except when you call.

RAVE SMART 911 FOR BUSINESS LOCATIONS

Rave Smart 911 also allows local businesses to share important information about their business. Such as keyholder information, emergency contacts, alarm company information and whether there are dangerous conditions or chemicals stored in the building. BACK COUNTRY SOS



Back County SOS is an app developed by Teton County Search and Rescue. This app is available in areas where text to 911 is available. If you have the app on your phone and get lost, hurt, stuck or any other emergency you can utilize the app to notify emergency services without using a lot of your phone's battery power. It also works where there is very little cellular service when a phone call may not go through. It will provide your location, the type of emergency, and the battery power you have remaining. You can then text back and forth with the dispatcher to get help without using all your remaining battery power. There is nothing to do other than install the app on your phone, no need to sign up for anything. The website lists the counties in Wyoming and other states where this is available. This App is a must have for the outdoor sportsmen in all seasons, so download for iPhone and Android today!

ALERT SENSE



Alert Sense has replaced Code Red for our community and is provided by Carbon County Emergency Management. Users can sign up at www.rawlinswy.gov/alertsense or by downloading from Google Play or the Apple App Store. AlertSense alerts citizens of ongoing emergency situations in the county before they are eligible for Reverse 911/IPAWS alerts. It also utilized the IPAWS alerting system for weather related issues, amber alerts, and national security issues. By signing up for AlertSense you will receive more of the alerts that matter to you, as you can select between dozens of choices when you sign-up.

VOIANCE LANGUAGE SERVICES

For our non-English speaking citizens, we subscribe to Voiance. With a quick phone call, we can get an interpreter on the line to help us better understand the needs of the caller with very little delay or frustration. This service aids in many different languages. This service is also available to our officer on the street if they encounter a language barrier.

You see things we don't!

Let us know about problem areas at rawlinswy.org/concern or call Public Works at 307-328-4599. We often have a snow plow driver focused on problematic areas during large snow events.

Remember:

- It's illegal to push snow into City streets or other right-of-ways. It is dangerous for you, City workers, and traffic as it creates dangerous driving conditions and humps in the road.
- Sidewalk and driveway openings are the responsibility of the property owner.
- During a snow emergency, all #1 (one) priority routes have a special "No Parking" ban to allow for better snow control. These routes are clearly marked with signs. Parking can resume after it's plowed.
- We use gravity plows which are designed to ride on the top of snow pack. Snow removal to the pavement causes issues with water valves, manholes and the road generally.
- There are approximately 85 miles of streets in Rawlins. Average snowfall in Rawlins is about 52 inches per year, which is complicated by strong winds. Because of the high cost of equipment and labor, the City cannot economically justify removal of all snowfall from every street in the City.
- The snow removal plan was designed so very few residents have to go more than a few blocks to get to a plowed street.
- Our first goal is to have priorities one and two, which includes all school and public transit routes, plowed and deiced and/or sanded by 7:30 am. This is influenced by the severity of the storm. Our second goal is to have all remaining priority streets plowed within three working days.

How can I help?

- Use snow tires or chains when necessary.
- Brake slowly. Allow room between yourself and the next vehicle.
- Clear your sidewalk and do not push snow into the City street.
- In reduced visibility, watch for pedestrians.
- Be patient. Plan in extra travel time.
- Give snow removal personnel time and space to work.



As part of the Strategic Plan Directive “Community Trust and Engagement”, one of the Initiatives is to “Increase the City’s efforts in training and recognizing volunteers.” A project identified in the Plan is to “Establish a Committee to create a training and recognition program for volunteers.”

A Committee was developed in November 2021. One of the programs the Committee has identified to help recognize volunteers is a **Community Builder Award**. This award will be presented to Rawlins residents monthly at City Council meetings.

The Community Builder Award is a monthly award the City presents to local individuals, businesses, and organizations for their volunteer service, sponsorship, promotion of programs and events, outstanding service in the interest of the City, and for other contributions significant to the quality of life in Rawlins.

August 2022 Recipient: Damien Cesko





Quasi-Judicial Boards

The seven-member **Board of Adjustments** reviews applications for variances from zoning requirements, appeals from administrative decisions concerning zoning, and certification of legal non-conforming uses. Members serve a three-year term, with appointments in January. Meetings held on third Thursday, 5:30, City Hall.

The seven-member **Planning & Zoning Commission** is responsible for preparing and updating the Comprehensive Plan, Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision regulations; advising the City Council on adoption of regulations, zoning changes and subdivisions; and approving Special Use Permits. Members serve a three-year term, with appointments in January. Meetings held on second Tuesday, 5:30, City Hall.

Civil Service Commissions

The three-member **Fire Civil Service Commission** governs the Fire Department's civil service rules and regulations and oversees hiring and promotions for fulltime paid, uniformed firefighters. Members serve a three-year term, with appointments in November and February. Meetings held as necessary, Fire Station #2.

The three-member **Police Civil Service Commission** governs the Police Department's civil service rules and regulations and oversees hiring and promotions for police officers. Members serve a three-year term, with appointments in January. Meeting held on third Thursday, 4:00 pm, Police Department.

Special District

The nine-member **Rawlins DDA/Main Street Board** and their four main committees work to make downtown Rawlins a vibrant, revitalized, sustainable historic district that is family-friendly with great dining, retail and entertainment for the community and visitors. Members serve a four-year term, with appointments in December. Meetings held on third Monday, 4:00 pm, Rawlins DDA/Main Street.

Advisory Boards

The nine-member **Parks & Recreation Advisory Committee** advises on the development of recreational facilities, parks and programs to enhance physical and mental well-being of all ages and to add meaning to the leisure time of the entire community. This committee includes two youth members with a one-year term appointed in June, and seven adult members with a three-year term appointed in December. Meetings held on the first Thursday, 6:00 pm, Recreation Center.

The seven-member **Rochelle Ranch Golf Course Advisory Board** advises on the use of the sport of golf for promoting the physical and mental well-being of residents of all ages and adding meaning to the leisure time of the entire community. Members serve a three-year term, with appointments in December. Meetings held on third Monday, 6:00 pm, Golf Course.

The nine-member **Rawlins Community Shooting Ranges Advisory Board** advises on the use of the shooting sports in promoting the physical and mental well-being, to encourage the safe and effective training, education, and development of shooters and to promote the shooting sports and competitions at the facilities. Members serve a three-year term, with appointments in June. Meetings held on the second Wednesday, 6:00 pm, May-October at Outdoor Range, November-April at Recreation Center.

The six-member **Urban Mule Deer Advisory Group** uses data to recommend a plan with various control alternatives to the Rawlins City Council that will decrease the number of urban deer conflicts while maintaining a healthy deer population for all to see and enjoy. Two citizens are appointed for a two-year term, with the next appointments in January 2023. Meetings held as necessary, City Hall.

Joint Power and Intergovernmental Boards

The City of Rawlins appoints one member to the ten-member **Carbon County Visitor's Council Board** that administers the local lodging tax to promote our County to tourists and travelers and to provide advertising, marketing, and sponsorship grants. Members serve a three-year term, with the next appointment in June 2025. Meetings held on third Wednesday, 10:00 am, various locations.

The City of Rawlins appoints half of the seven-member **Old Penitentiary Joint Powers Board**, whose mission is to preserve and operate the Wyoming Frontier Prison Historic Site and provide historic significance, tourism, education, and recreational opportunities for the visitors and residents of the City of Rawlins and Carbon County. Members serve a three-year term, with appointments in April. Meetings held on second Thursday, 6:00 pm, Wyoming Frontier Prison.

The City of Rawlins appoints half of the seven-member **Rawlins-Carbon County Airport Board** which provides control, supervision, maintenance, operation, and expansion of joint City-County Airport to furnish airport service to both the City and County. Members serve a five-year term, with appointments in January. Meetings held on 2nd Wednesday, 5:15 pm, Airport.

The fifteen-person **Rawlins Urban Systems Committee** includes four citizens appointed by the City of Rawlins. This is a requirement of the Department of Transportation to obtain public input to determine the priority for certain street development and improvement projects, which are funded by the department with Federal Funding specifically allocated for Urban Centers. Members serve a four-year term, with appointments in January. Meetings held as necessary, City Hall.

CLEAR THE

FOG

FATS, OILS, GREASE

Fats, Oils and Grease (FOG) come from food preparation and kitchen clean-up. FOG may look like liquid when drained, but it solidifies when discharged into the sanitary sewer. This results in clogged drains and sewage backups, potentially damaging personal property.

MYTH

I can pour grease down the drain if I run hot water with it.

I can scrape kitchen waste down the drain if I use the garbage disposal.

Pouring grease down the drain with dish soap will completely dissolve the grease.

I can discard grease in my tub, shower, or toilet.

FACT

Grease poured down the drain, even with hot water, will eventually cool and solidify in the sewer pipe.

The garbage disposal only grinds up items before discharging them to the sewer system but does not eliminate FOG.

Most dish soaps break up grease, but once cooled, the grease will still solidify in the sewer system.

FOG poured in a bathtub, shower, or toilet will end up in the same sewer system that the sink drains to and may cause damage.

WHAT SHOULD I DO?

- Wipe loose food and grease from dishes before washing them in the sink.
- Scrape food scraps into a garbage can or compost bin.
- Pour all grease and cooking oil into a covered container and dispose of it in the garbage.
- Clean grease with absorbent materials, like paper towels, and then throw the material in the garbage.



CONTRACTORS, CONSTRUCTION, THE CITY & YOU

An introduction by the City of Rawlins

Our purpose

The goal of the City of Rawlins for contractor licensing, construction permits and inspections is to ensure building codes are being met for the health and safety of current and future residents. We require all contractors working within City limits to be licensed per Rawlins Municipal Code 15.28.020. Work can also be performed by homeowners provided that all work meets the requirements of the code, a permit is issued, and is inspected by the building inspector.

Why a Licensed Contractor?

The City of Rawlins requires contractors to be licensed for three reasons:

1. Our licensing process includes the contractor proving they have relevant training and experience. This varies by type of work they perform, and certain contractors such as electrical and plumbing are also regulated by the state.
2. Our licensing requires the contractor is current with their general liability insurance, which provides protection for the quality of the work and protects you from liability if the contractor is injured on your property.
3. We help hold licensed contractors accountable for pulling the proper permits and for getting the required inspections, to check the quality of work.

How do I find a contractor?

The City can help you find a licensed contractor. Our office has a complete list of current licensed contractors available upon request in person, by email or by phone. All contractor's files, including any complaints, are public record available upon request. Contractors should be able to furnish a copy of their current license with their name, number and expiration date.

What are my responsibilities when I hire a contractor?

Although the City has a system to help protect our residents, the homeowner also has responsibilities.

- If you are starting a project, we can help from the beginning. Visit with Community Development and even schedule a site visit for free to understand the process your project will require.
- Make sure your contractor is licensed by the City.
- For all construction that requires a permit, various inspections will be required which are listed on the permit paperwork. Touch base with your contractor and/or the City about these inspections.
- If you ever have any concerns about your contractor, please reach out to the Community Development Department. The sooner we are notified, the more able we are to help identify the issue and take action.
- Contractors are required to show they are completing the work properly. We prefer to work with the contractor to correct the issue. If they do not, they can be fined, given a violation letter, and even have their license removed by the City.

What other protection do I have?

The City of Rawlins is limited to fining contractors and eventually removing their license. If you have problems with the work done by a contractor, you do have options to pursue:

1. Collecting against the contractor's insurance, either independently or in conjunction with your homeowner's insurance.
2. Make a legal claim against the contractor in civil court.






